

#### Enter to Learn ...

William and Sarah first met and fell in love in their home country in western Africa. Excited to start their family, the couple began having children quickly after they were married. The young family was living comfortably until war disrupted their world. Facing dangerous conditions and a lack of resources and stability, William and Sarah relocated their family to the United States. Shortly after their arrival, they welcomed their daughter, Jamie.

The family eventually settled down in the Midwest, but they faced some challenges here, too. William and Sarah began working long hours to support their family in a new and unfamiliar country. As their oldest children grew up and went through high school, they found that they were being exposed to negative influences and drawn into a world of substance use and poor choices. Left feeling like they were out of options, William and Sarah reached out to Mooseheart as their youngest child, Jamie, entered middle school. They wanted to protect Jamie from the path that their older children stumbled onto.

Now that she is at Mooseheart, Jamie is able to pursue her education in a safer environment, with plenty of positive influences and support to set her up for future success.



Mooseheart's youngest community of students, affectionately known as Baby Village, is a special place. Full of love, laughter, and opportunity, you can really feel the heart of our mission here. Mooseheart's goal is to prepare our students to "leave to serve," and the Family Teachers who serve in Baby Village are starting with the basics. By focusing not only on skills and education, but also on stability and support, Mooseheart helps to build a solid foundation that will propel this group of young students toward a successful future.

While Baby Village's current residents might not understand how each and every thing they do at Mooseheart is helping them prepare for the future, that doesn't mean that they are learning any less. When they are helping to write a thank you note for a new toy or a generous gift, they don't know that they are learning how to be grateful for all of life's blessings. When they are practicing how to brush a horse or feed the farm



animals, they don't know that they are learning how to care for the world around them. Even when they are just sharing their toys or welcoming a new student into their home, they don't know that they are really learning what it means to be generous to someone else. They might not realize that they are building these skills, but it all adds up.

Of course, while we have our ways to set them up for success, our Baby Village students have their own ideas about the future. Archie, age 5, "wants to be Spiderman when he grows up." On the other hand, Joy, age 4, just looks forward to growing up – literally. She wants to be "bigger" and "higher." These students are also really focused on honing the skills they think they will need in the future. Archie reports that he is good at "his race track," while Exodus, age 3, is proud to be "good at riding horsey!"

While we can't wait to see how these students "leave to serve" in the future, we also celebrate the small steps forward in the meantime. We are grateful for every single moment we get to support them at Mooseheart. In the words of Exodus, "Tomorrow makes me happy. And cookie monsters."
