

Enter to Learn . . . Emily's early life with her parents was very unstable. The family frequently moved around from one place to another, often facing unsanitary conditions or an unsafe environment. As things grew more difficult for the family, they often found themselves without enough food. Emily's father became abusive to her mother, and her mother then turned to substance use. This desperate situation led to Emily's grandmother, Lily, to step in as her guardian. While Emily faced much better circumstances with her grandmother, Lily was having trouble providing for the needs of a growing child now that she was in her 70s. In need of some assistance, she turned to Mooseheart. At Mooseheart, Emily now has a clean, safe, and healthy living environment with more academic and extracurricular opportunities than she would have had living with Lily. She is grateful for the security and support that she experiences at Mooseheart, while still being able to visit her loving grandmother on the occasional school break.

...Leave to Serve

Each year, students at Mooseheart High School are elected by their peers to be a part of "Democracy School." Individuals from each grade – freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors – are chosen as class representatives to address any student concerns throughout the year. With guidance from staff advisors, Democracy School students work with school leadership to bring about changes that the student body wants. This includes things like "dress down" days, where students can opt for more casual clothing instead of their uniform for a day, or changes to school lunch options.

In May, high school students involved in Mooseheart's Democracy School took a trip to the state capital of Springfield, Illinois. The Democracy School representatives got to take an up-close look at their state government, starting with a personal visit with Karina Villa, an Illinois state senator whose district includes Mooseheart's campus. The students were able to learn about a bill that Senator Villa is working on that has gone to the Senate floor, before taking a tour of the Illinois State Capitol Building where they witnessed a floor session in action. Before heading home to Mooseheart, the Democracy School students were also able to visit president Abraham Lincoln's tomb and former home.

Democracy School helps many of Mooseheart's students to learn the basics of civic leadership and prepares them for participation in public life outside of school – just another way our students are ready to "leave to serve" upon graduation.
